

Director's Report Sechelt Public Library

May 30, 2021 – June 26, 2021 By Leianne Emery

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1. Something You May Not Know...

We have always talked about libraries doing more and more – with less and less... So here is something to think about.

At our library you can:

- 1. Use a public computer (for free)
 - a. Our staff are always ready and available to assist and much staff time is taken up by this
- 2. Scan documents (free)
 - a. Our staff scan documents for patrons as it requires a bit more specific navigation on the photocopier machine
- 3. Fax documents (slight charge as we use our phone lines and there is a cost)
 - a. Our staff also assist patrons with sending faxes. We are almost the ONLY place on the Sunshine Coast where patrons can still send a fax. I have even assisted with faxing extremely time sensitive organ donor documents and our staff have helped with much more. Many government documents still have a fax requirement.
- 4. Print documents (slight costs)
 - a. We have photocopiers in the library for public use, and they are used on a consistent basis. Besides all the computer assistance our staff give in general, some printing jobs also demand much staff time. 8 out of 10 printing jobs require 5-20 minutes of staff time each. If you want to print something, you can do it a number of ways:
 - 1) Sign on to Library WIFI (patrons always require staff assistance with this), send a print job from your phone directly to the printer. Staff then handle the transaction for payment.
 - 2) Sign on to Library WIFI (patrons always require staff assistance with this), send a print job from your own laptop directly to the printer. Staff then handle to transaction for payment.
 - 3) Sign on to a library public computer, send your print job to the print queue, make payment in the coin op which then will release your print job. Troubleshooting assistance (navigating the computer, finding documents online, formatting, print issues, etc) can take our staff enormous amounts of staff time. This can involve everything from assisting with huge architectural drawings, difficult navigation of government websites, financial assistance document printing or strange formatting. What Id like to point out here is that we always have, but overwhelmingly since the beginning of COVID, helped patrons with things government offices (Service BC and Service Canada) SHOULD have been doing and should be doing but weren't and aren't. Even CRA tax forms are not being supplied to the post offices in large enough quantities because somehow the CRA thinks everyone should be clever enough or even have the ability to go online. We end up navigating CRA website

- with very frustrated and anxious patrons who need assistance printing out forms for physically fill in.
- 4) Walk up to a staff member and get assistance with any print job. We are always here to help with patrons print jobs. Again, much staff time is taken.

5. Obtain free Technology Assistance

- a. We are fortunate we have a Technology Education Coordinator and someone extraordinary in it.
- b. Technology assistance is yet again another thing patrons are needing from libraries that goes way beyond books.
- c. To date in 2021 we have given over 130 hours of FREE assistance and instruction to patrons through personal one on one appointments, in a quiet and private area we created, with everything they need technical assistance with. We also assist patrons via phone and email. Patrons come from all over the place Roberts Creek, Sechelt, Halfmoon Bay, Pender and Egmont. This is an amazing service in our community and we to be able to offer it at such a professional level.

2. Mask Fighting - Policing our Library

And the policing continues... Library staff still encounter patrons whose masks have purposely "slipped down" below the nose and or mouth. The favorite hangout location for our mask vigilante's is the reading area in the magazine section and in the second public computer area. Even yesterday, a mask wearing patron go into a vicious argument with a patron who didn't want to wear his mask properly and fists were even drawn. Again, our objective is that all patrons feel safe and welcome in our library space. This requires extra staff time to go on "patrol" for the specific purpose of enforcing the mask order.



7. BC Provincial Grant for Libraries

The BC Province Libraries Branch has just advised that the BC Provincial Grant for libraries for 2021 will be awarded on the same grant funding basis as 2020 (\$78k). No increase no decrease. The larger problem is that, as you know, this provincial grant has not increased in the past 12 years.

I have spoken about this issue many times with all of you and many times during the funding requests at budgeting meetings. Every year we are asked to do more and more as libraries in our communities. The vast number of issues we assist patrons with, the services we offer, the programs and activities we put on, the technology assistance services we offer, the printing we do, the problems we solve – it increases year after year. What libraries do in their communities goes so much beyond books.

This means that the municipalities and organizations that fund every library in BC, have to, year after year, make up for the stagnant funding levels the province of BC allocates. Costs have most certainly increased in 12 years and the provincial grant has not. This is not right. As a consequence, our "asks" of the funders each year are kept to such a bare minimum, sometimes even to our detriment, so that the funders burden is kept as low as possible.

Although every library organization, collectively and separately, has been campaigning year after year to the BC Province for a change to their library funding allocation, we are now also asking our municipalities to campaign with Josie Osborne, Minister of Municipal Affairs (libraries as also now a part of this ministry). I have spoken about this with SCRD Chair Lori Pratt and DOS Mayor Siegers as well. This is the <u>basis of a letter</u> we will be supplying (in conjunction with my Association of BC Libraries Directors Group) to the District of Sechelt in their effort, along with other SSC partners, in their quest for a meeting in September with Minister Osborne to discuss, among other things, library funding.

\$22 Million in 2022

The Ask: A sustained, ongoing increase to the public library annual operating grants to \$22 million a year in 2022. Moving forward, we also ask that the increase be tied to inflation.

Public libraries require continuous and increasing investment to provide opportunities for life-long learning, increase equity and social inclusion, and create cities that are healthier and more affordable.

Since 2009, public library supporters have asked that the provincial government provide funding for public libraries that, at a minimum, includes annual increases to account for inflation. Despite these repeated requests, public libraries have been left with chronic provincial underfunding at approximately \$14 million.

While the provincial funding has declined in the past decade, the municipal portion has risen considerably. This decline in provincial funding reflects a regressive approach of shifting cost to municipal property tax payers.

This year we are asking the provincial government for \$22 million for public libraries in 2022. This request for sustained, increased funding was supported by the Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services as part of the Budget 2020 and 2021 Consultation process.

We ask that the BC government commit to increasing library funding to a minimum of \$22 million annually to reflect inflationary and population increases and recommit to a progressive funding approach, reflecting the role of public libraries in achieving the goals of the Province and our communities.

8. Grant Application – CVITP

CVITP = Community Volunteer Income Tax Program. We are now able to apply for this grant in 2021 and will be doing so next week. Based on the number of tax preparations we accommodated in our Sechelt Library, we can apply for up to a maximum of \$500 to help cover costs associated with providing this service. Terri Fjaagesund, our fabulous volunteer, prepared **184 tax returns - for FREE** to patrons at Sechelt Library. Terry tells us that Sechelt Library accommodated the most tax preparations EVER per volunteer within this CVITP program. We are proud of this as we really went out of our way to ensure every available time slot and location possible was available to Terry so she could prepare taxes – for FREE – for the citizens in Sechelt, Roberts Creek, Halfmoon Bay, Pender Harbour and Egmont.

9. Grant Application – Canada Healthy Communities Initiative

The District of Sechelt, the SIGD and the Sechelt Library are partnering on a grant application for Canada Health Communities Initiative. A reorganization of the exterior space surrounding the Library Building, the recreation Centre, the Police Station and the Seaside Centre is being discussed to make room for a larger gathering space in the center. This center Gathering Space would potentially hold children's play areas, a large outdoor covered area where we could host library programs and events and incorporate native craftsmanship structures as well.

Update:

At the June16th council meeting, a document entitled "Journeying Together in Partnership" was presented. Eight separate projects were included including the Gathering Space discussed above. 4 of those 8 projects, included the Gathering Space, were identified as being good candidates for application under the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative grant. After additional discussions with the District, this Gathering Space project should be in the final stages, if not complete, in the \$250,000 grant application process.

The District requested that I submit a Letter of Support for the grant application process. It is noted below.

Sechelt Public Library supports the District of Sechelt, our landlord, in their grant application for "a safe and vibrant public space" through the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative. Here is why.

Libraries save lives. I was told that by a patron and I believe her. We, as staff, are here to serve our community, in whatever way we can, and positively affect their daily lives. More than just books, we listen, we educate, we assist and we even entertain. We also partner with many community organizations to bring the best of ideas to our community members.

COVID 19 forced us to respond to an ever-changing health and safety environment and adapt accordingly. During this evolution of adaption, needs had now become very apparent in this new environment of heightened awareness on health and safety. We needed to adapt our programming and services to be able to adapt to an outdoor setting. We needed the ability to: host outdoor music programs like ukulele playing, have community members knit outdoors in a fresh air environment, host outdoor literacy events like Drag Queen Story Telling, host outdoor chair yoga for seniors and to partner with a Shishalh Nation artisan in the carving of a native canoe or totem pole in the spirit of reconciliation and in being good community neighbors.

Our library staff came up with a wish list of great outdoor space improvement ideas for the adaption of our programming and services, ultimately benefitting the community as a whole. These great ideas became part of the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative Grant Application called "A Gathering Place" applied for by the District of Sechelt.

Please consider this grant application with high regard. Not only our library, but our community as a whole, will ultimately be enriched.

- 3 kits in total


LIGHT THERAPY KITS (Happy Lights):







14. Union Job Reclassification

Stage 1 still in progress – just slightly delayed. Hope to have stage 1 completed by July 15th.

Stage 1: Beth (appointed by the union) and I go through each job description and update. This takes much time as we are analyzing very carefully that not only the description accurately reflects what that position actually does (through various means) but we are also incorporating consistency throughout all sections of each job description and consistency from one to another.

Stage 2: Each staff member will then review their own newly created job description and advise if they agree.

Stage 3: A team of 2 union members and two non-union members (myself and a Board member) will go through another process of banding the jobs in a variety of categories to accurately reflect pay scale for job duties and responsibilities.

15. Staffing Changes

As one of our treasured staff members will be away from work, due to illness, for a few months, we are in the process of undergoing some significant changes in terms of workload and duties. As much as possible, training has been fast and furious as time is not on our side. No-one is easily replaceable so our current staff are all sharing in the duties associated with that position. This is going to put a lot of extra pressure on our staff who are already very busy - but no-one is complaining. We are a team and we will all get through this phase.

We also have two staff members currently taking Reference training (both online studying and SPL custom one-on-one training). Two more staff members will take Reference training over the summer and fall. It is necessity to have more staff qualified and trained to cover different positions as we are a <u>very lean</u> staff. Union guidelines and expectations are sometimes tricky but we will figure it out. Life before limb. We need training.

As annual budgets are fixed (and always tight), accommodating any deviation to our initial monetary requirement calculations is challenging.

16. Services for Print Disabilities in our Library

Sechelt Library is a free resource to all patrons for services, education and online resources in the areas of accessibility. In addition to assisting many patrons navigate through the new CNIB Daisy Reader Program, Janette has been busy educating patrons who now require other accessibility options and assisting patrons that currently use a variety of platforms but are having challenges. As a note of interest, I've included our updated brochure on "Services for Print Disabilities".

Note: Even if you do not have print disabilities, reading a Large Print Book can be quite enjoyable. We have almost 2000 Large Print Books in our collection. They are noted by a yellow and black spine label.



19. Archives Update

Ann Watson, the Archivist for the Sechelt Community Archives is actually on out Library payroll! The SCRD pays us in advance for her salary and we do the administration. Ann used to work from the Sechelt Library but now has space above the Royal Bank (the District of Sechelt also supports). I ran into Ann the other day and asked is she could give us a quick update on what she has been up to as I believe all of us would find this interesting. Here is what Ann wrote:

Hello Leianne here is an account of work done in the archives over the last 18 months!

SECHELT COMMUNITY ARCHIVES

REPORT FOR 2020 to JUNE, 2021 FOR THE SECHELT PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD

The archives moved in February 2020 from the Sechelt Library to new quarters above the Royal Bank in the Trail Bay Mall. We were very sorry to leave the Library but do enjoy our new spacious suite of three rooms!

The past 18 months have been very different for myself and volunteers in the archives. After our move we were shut down for three months -from mid-March until mid-June. I resumed working but have had no volunteers in the archives to date.

ARCHIVAL WORK:

Donors continued to place their records in the archives: eight accessions and numerous accruels have been made despite the lock-down. We received textual records and photographs from the Sunshine Coast Dance Society, national ballerina the late Lois Smith, MacMillan Bloedel maps and photographs from a former employee, records of a northern B.C. former NHL hockey player (not a famous one) from a Gibson's resident, a novel about life in Madeira Park, a local family's interesting history, and photos of the first electric power plant in Selma Park, to list a few! Updating our computer inventory and new locations for our boxes and filing cabinets information is ongoing, as is preparing the Helen Dawe files for digitizing.

RESEARCH:

We received 44 requests for information and 45 hours was spent finding the answers. Many hours were spent looking for information for our February 2020 Heritage Week and for the October Sechelt Arts Festival displays by myself and my volunteers. Six students requested the Len van Egmond files for the 2021 annual scholarship.

VOLUNTEERS:

Until the lock-down archives volunteers Bruce Redmond, Gordon Cassidy and Janet Ansell worked for 44 hours on various projects. I am sorry to say Bruce died last November; he was a very valuable resource for the archives; having been born and brought up in Sechelt. No volunteers are back yet in the archives although Janet continues to work at home preparing the digitization programme for the Helen Dawe Collection.

OTHER WORK:

I submitted a brief report to the Sunshine Coast Museum and Archives AGM last month. The Coast Reporter has published three articles 'From the Archives' over the past year. For Heritage Week 2020 I put up a display about the Lady Rose, the last Union Steamship still afloat and acquired recently by Mr. Clayton. The October Sechelt Arts Festival also had a display about the Lady Rose prepared by the archives.

My sincere thanks to you and all the library staff for your continued support, help and interest in the archives.





Summer Reading Club

Pick up your reading log June 14th!

- 1. Pick up your Reading Log at the Sechelt Library starting June 14th.
- 2. Add a checkmark for every day you read.
- 3. Bring your Reading Log to the library each week to get a sticker.
- 4. Bring your completed Reading Log to Sechelt Library anytime after August 15th and get a medal for your reading achievement!

We have reading logs for school age children 5-12 and "Read to Me" logs for children under 5. Visit bcsrc.ca to find the Summer Reading Club app.

FAQs:

- 1. Do I have to start reading June 14th and finish by August 15th?
 - No, you do not have to finish or start your Reading Logs on any particular date. As long as you read you can come and get your medal and weekly prizes. You can also claim multiple prizes if you can't make it down to the library every week. If you miss a day, just count 7 days of reading over a longer time period to get your stickers.
- 2. What if I'm traveling during the summer?
 - You can go to any BC library and bring your reading log to get your stickers or you can wait until you're back home to get multiple stickers at once. Just keep reading while you're traveling!
- 3. How much reading should I do to count it as a day of reading?
 - You can set your own goal! Some people like to read twenty minutes a day,
 while others like to read a chapter or a whole picture book.
- 4. Do I have to have a library card to get a Reading Log?
 - No, you do not have to have a library card to get a Reading Log, but if you have one you have access to all kinds of books to make your reading more fun!
- 5. What kind of books count for Summer reading?
 - Anything you like! Non-fiction, graphic novels, picture books, chapter books, audiobooks, ebooks - the sky is the limit!

Most programs require individual registration. Make sure to register ASAP as these programs fill up fast!
