

# Director's Report Sechelt Public Library

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## 1. Did you know...

...that Claire has just completed a multi-page "Shelving Guideline for Volunteers". As discussed in the September Directors Report (see section 2 page 4) Claire is now doing all the work with the Public Services volunteers – and doing an amazing job. Training takes much time, and, to make the education component easier, and so the volunteers have a document to reference, Claire has created the Shelving Guidelines for each section of the library. Here is an excerpt from adult fiction:

Shelve alphabetically by author.

When two or more items exist under the same last name, shelve alphabetically by **first** name and then **last** name.

When two or more items exist under the same first **and** last name, shelve alphabetically by title (omitting The/A/An).

F Atwo <u>The Handmaid's Tale</u>

comes before...

F Atwo <u>Lady Oracle</u>

**Note:** When the first part of a title is a **Numeral** (1,2,3,4,5 etc), shelve before letters in numerical order.

F Patt  $4^{th}$  of July

comes before...

F Patt Alert

## 3. Accessibility Acts

#### Canada:

- The Accessibility Canada Act received Royal assent in June 2019.

#### Provincial:

- Four provinces have all passed accessibility legislation: Ontario, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and Ouebec
- Three additional provinces are intending to pass legislation: Newfoundland, New Brunswick and Saskatchewan (go Roughriders)
- The Accessible BC Act received Royal Assent on June 17, 2021.

#### Accessible BC Act:

- Accessibility legislation seeks to identify, remove and prevent barriers to inclusion experienced by people with disabilities.
- The legislation will:
  - o Enable government to establish accessibility standards
  - Allow for the establishment of a Provincial Accessibility Committee to support the development of Accessibility Standards
  - Direct BC Government to establish a multiyear accessibility plan, accessibility advisory committee and feedback mechanism

#### What does this mean for Sechelt Public Library?

- The Province is still establishing recommendations as to which types of industries this new legislation will apply to but more than likely it will be applicable to libraries.
- We will likely eventually be required to:
  - Establish an accessibility committee
    - Must have at least 50% members with disabilities
    - Must represent the diversity of British Columbians
    - Must have indigenous representation
  - Establish and accessibility plan
  - Establish a mechanism for feedback

#### Our Sechelt Staff:

Among the many things Janette does, she is also our local specialist in Accessible Services. These unique services are more in demand than ever. These can include, but are certainly not limited to: sourcing specialized audio books for patrons with accessibility issues (eg. daisy reader compatible), one on one instruction in the of operation of Daisy Players (we just purchased two additional), instruction in how to access specialized digital downloads and in the correct usage of screen readers (eg. voice-over on apple i-pads and i-phones, talk back on android), working with patron's unique accessibility settings on their own devices, instruction in Easy Reader app design for visual and reading impairments like dyslexia.

#### 4. Provincial Health Orders

Orders by the Provincial Health Officer (PHO), provincial restrictions and guidance change frequently – almost daily. The safety protocols and practices we currently have in place currently come from:

- 1. BC Provincial Order on Gatherings and Events (October 25, 2021)
- 2. BC Provincial Order on Face Coverings (September 28, 2021)
- 3. BC Provincial Order on COVID 19 Vaccination Status (September 9, 2021). This order was officially "archived" and there is no current Order available.

#### What does this mean for the library?

- 1. Face Coverings: (the mask mandate was just extended on October 29th)
  - Face coverings <u>must still be worn</u> at all times while <u>in a library facility</u> (community room, foyer and library)
    - The most recent change now requires persons age 5+ to be wearing masks. The previous age was 12+.
    - Masks may now be removed by a staff member is it to aid in communication with someone who is hearing impaired. We have chosen this allowable option to be restricted to when we are sitting at the Reference and Circulation desks only.
    - Although we are now technically allowed to remove them in a staff area, most libraries are still adopting the practice of the previous regulations of having staff wear a mask while walking in the staff areas but allowing the mask to come off while sitting at our desks.
    - o Indoor Programming does require masks
  - Face Covering are **NOT** required for our <u>outdoor</u> activities and programming.

#### 2. Vaccine Passports:

- We continue to assist many patrons in accessing government websites to print off their vaccine passports. Patron struggle with access, navigation and printing.
- Vaccine passports are <u>NOT required to be checked when entering the library</u> facility.
  - This exclusion also applies to Book Faires and Repair Café or outside organizations using the libraries facilities <u>BUT they MUST stay under</u> 50 people in attendance at one time
  - Vaccine Passport checking with ID checking would be required if we had an event with 50 people or more

#### 3. Cleaning Procedures:

• We are still abiding by morning and evening cleaning requirements in the third phase of the BC Restart Plan which commenced July 1 (with some alterations) as they are more stringent than the current Communicable Disease Plans. The public washrooms are cleaned by the janitorial service daily. (Speaking of public washrooms...last week one of our dungeons and dragons participants found a needle hidden in one of the bathroom stalls, Jeff assisted a man who had collapsed in the washroom entrance due to physical disability and someone stole the swing arm that keeps the family washroom locked. All in a week's events at the library. All have been addressed.)

#### **Internal Budget**

#### Hit by a Bus Binder:

In furtherance to last month's entry on this topic, MJ and I have worked hard to complete the information in the "hit by a bus" binder for our Financial Statements and budgeting purposes. This binder outlines every receivable and expenditure that our Financial Statement line items include and is a key aid used in cash projections and budgeting.

#### 2022 - 2026 Budget:

MJ and I have put this budget together and the finance committee has gone over it in detail with me. It will be presented at the Board Meeting.

#### **Outstanding Salary and Benefit Component:**

As this is the largest segment of the budget, it is not optimal that we do not yet have finalization of this process. The months long staff job re-evaluation project is essentially complete and final results were presented to CUPE 391 Union. More work with the Union will happen in October.

#### **SCRD Special Corporate and Administrative Services Committee**

Although we currently have a 5-year funding Agreement in place with our three main funders (SCRD, DOS and the SIGD), we will still be presenting a 5-year budget to the SCRD with a slightly different format to last year.

Pre-budget November 1 and 2 (we do not be to submit or present at this meeting)

Round 1 December 13-15 (our submission must be in by November 15)

Round 2 January 24-26, 2022

Final Adoption Plan February 24, 2022




















#### 11. Union Job Reclassification

- Stage 1: Complete. All job descriptions have now been revised and rewritten into their draft state.
- Stage 2: Complete. Local union representative (Sam) approval of initial revamps of the job descriptions.
- Stage 3: Complete: CUPE Union head, Kari, to approve initial job description revamps
- Stage 4: Complete. Each staff member reviews their own newly created job description
- Stage 5: Complete. Initial banding and rating the jobs in a variety of categories to accurately reflect pay scale for job duties and responsibilities.
- Stage 6: Not complete. Final rating and banding process has not yet been achieved and we are working within the Union process to complete.

## 12. Staffing Updates

Jason Gregory, our new Technology education coordinator, is now fully trained in Circulation (thank-you Teresa and Janette) and has already been able to schedule 40+ one-on-one ½ hour appointments for technology assistance for the month of October alone. He is also proctoring Exam Invigilations. In the new year, hopefully, we will be able to commence some classroom style group computer and software tutorial sessions.

#### 13. Transit Tickets

A very good service we are able to offer to the public, but again, much staff time! January 1, 2021 to October 22, 2021, we have sold to the public:

- 38 adult passes
- 83 student/senior passes
- books of 10 tickets

We have made \$445 in commissions. The Recreation Center has finally resumed selling transit tickets again, so this has negatively impacted out upward trend in ticket sales!




