### 2. Grants

#### **Canada Healthy Communities Grant**

This is the grant we applied for and received from the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative for \$7541. Our current cost calculations for materials and labor for cataloguing and packaging have allowed us to purchase a total of 30 Playaway Launchpads consoles, all geared towards Brain Games:

### **Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary Grant**

We have just completed the written grant application to the Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary grant which focused on "initiatives that focus on a health benefit for the residents of the Sunshine Coast". Our request was for funding for the incredible adult Chair Yoga program we started in 2021 as well as an intergenerational 10-week course we would like to have in the summer. As our library funds will be much more limited this year (last year we had some extra grants), we have already had to cancel the Spanish classes and do not want to have to cancel the chair yoga as well. We put a thought of effort into this application and hope that we are successful.

### **Mask Wearing Public**

Masks wearing in a public space is now optional We still have a supply of masks to give to the public – for free

Not required to be in the library but are required for certain programming. See programming section below.

### **Hand Hygiene**

Staff are strongly encouraged to wash hands upon arrival at the workplace and often throughout the day.

### **Sanitizing**

Sanitizing stations still in place at front of library and various places within the library

#### **Physical Distancing**

No specific or strict rules about spacing but we are to take measures to avoid tight crowding in indoor public space as much as possible

#### Time allowance for vaccinations:

Staff do not have to use any official sick time for purposes of receiving vaccinations or booster shots. Time off during the work day is permitted without penalty.

#### **Ventilation:**

We have working in conjunction with the District of Sechelt (DOS) staff to ensure a proper ventilation system is in place and working efficiently. This is also checked by DOS staff periodically according to WorkSafe BC regulations.

#### **Staff Daily Health Check**

Staff are not allowed to come to work sick.

### **Seating**

No restrictions of placement. Furniture and chairs are placed within the library as per normal.

#### **Computer Access**

All public computer stations are still accessible and there are partitions between each station.

### **One-On One Tutoring**

Mask wearing is optional for technology assistance, genealogy tutoring and accessibility assistance. The table and computer have been rearranged so that the instructor and the student can be 6 feet apart and the computer swings easily to each person.

#### **Cleaning Procedures**

We have maintained a cleaning level above and beyond the cleaning required in the PHO's Communicable Disease Plan requirements or current PHO expectations. The following cleaning procedures are in place.

### Programming – indoor and outdoor

- 1. Children's programming OUTDOORS:
  - a. Mask wearing optional
  - b. No vaccine passports required
- 2. Children's programing INDOORS:
  - a. Mask wearing optional
  - b. No vaccine passports for children under 12
  - c. Vaccine passports are NOT required for ages 12 21 if they are participating in a program for children or youth BUT if an adult (age 22+) accompanies a kid to a program then vaccine passports ARE REQUIRED (even though age 22+ does NOT require one to be in the library).
- 3. Adult programming OUTDOORS:
  - a. No masks required
  - b. No vaccine passports required
- 4. Adult programing INDOORS:
  - a. Mask wearing optional
  - b. Vaccine passports required

We have been, and must continue to, post a current copy of the COVID 19 Re-Opening and Safety Plan both on the library website and in the staff workplace.

Note: New official Orders expected Wednesday April 8, 2022 (at 12:01) are anticipated to remove the requirement for mask wearing and vaccine passports in public spaces.






