2. Grants 2022

Canada Healthy Communities Grant

This is the grant we applied for and received from the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative for \$7541. Our current cost calculations for materials and labor for cataloguing and packaging have allowed us to purchase a total of 30 Playaway Launchpads consoles, all geared towards Brain Games:

Provincial Funding (one time)

As you know, that despite serious advocacy by all libraries and library advocate groups for over 12 years for increased **ongoing** library funding for **operational** requirements, the Province of BC has once again <u>not increased</u> library funding for 2022. It will remain at \$77,183 as it has been for 12 years. The Province has to give us **one-time** funding for emergency preparedness (\$10,395.21) and COVID-19 Relief and Recovery Grant (\$31,185.64).

Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary Grant

Our grant application to the Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary focused on "initiatives that focus on a health benefit for the residents of the Sunshine Coast". Our request was for funding for the incredible adult Chair Yoga program we started in 2021 as well as an intergenerational 10-week course we would like to have in the summer. As our library funds will be much more limited this year (last year we had some extra grants), we have already had to cancel the Spanish classes and do not want to have to cancel the chair yoga as well.

9. CUPE 391 Union Job Reclassification

Some tough decisions were made this month regarding the involvement of CUPE 391 National in this process. My decision was supported by both our staff Union Representative and the staff Union Alternate. We are now moving forward and are at a point where I need to work on a process to adequately relate correct wages to the weights and points each staff member now has associated with their job description in this 5 Factor Process. Again, this is a very separate consideration to any overall negotiated wage increase and only involves how each internal union job description relates to all other internal union job descriptions.

Although I had to make an educated guess at the outcome prior to the budget negotiations in 2020 and 2021, I would estimate that there will be more salary increases necessary than previously predicted. As I mentioned to our Funders in prior budget negotiations, this "educated guess vs actual outcome" was always a concern in terms of being potentially underestimated.







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

15. UNDRIP

United Nations declaration of the Rights of Indiginous Peoples (UNDRIP)

BC has released the Declaration Act Action Plan, developed in consultation and co-operation with Indigenous Peoples, outlining 89 specific actions every ministry in government will take to create a better province for Indigenous Peoples in B.C. We will be working with the BC provincial government on the impact of this action plan and government's approach as it relates to public library services.

The Province is releasing the Declaration Act Action Plan, developed in consultation and cooperation with Indigenous Peoples, outlining 89 specific actions every ministry in government will take to create a better province for Indigenous Peoples in B.C.

"This plan is a first for any government in the world. It will drive transformative change in the relationship with Indigenous Peoples and help us build a brighter future for everyone," said Premier John Horgan. "By working together in partnership, we are creating more opportunities, better jobs and stronger environment protections. This is a roadmap that builds on the progress we have made — a new way forward and another important step towards meaningful reconciliation."

British Columbia is the first province to release an action plan dedicated to implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People (UN Declaration) in Canada. The plan was developed with Indigenous Peoples, First Nations and organizations though intensive consultation. This significant engagement ensures the plan reflects the priorities of Indigenous Peoples – First Nations, Métis and Inuit – living in B.C.

It's about a better future.

The *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (Declaration Act)* became law in B.C. on November 28, 2019. Through this act, the Province formally adopted the internationally recognized standards of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UN Declaration).

The <u>Declaration Act Action Plan</u> (3.9MB PDF), released on March 30, 2022, outlines how we will bring the UN Declaration into harmony with our work over the next five years.

Together, in consultation and cooperation with Indigenous Peoples, we will advance reconciliation in tangible and measurable ways in B.C. – today and into the future.

Self-Determination and Inherent Right of Self-Government

Indigenous Peoples exercise and have full enjoyment of their rights to self-determination and self-government, including developing, maintaining and implementing their own institutions, laws, governing bodies, and political, economic and social structures related to Indigenous communities.



Title and Rights of Indigenous Peoples

Indigenous Peoples exercise and have full enjoyment of their inherent rights, including the rights of First Nations to own, use, develop and control lands and resources within their territories in B.C.



Ending Indigenous-Specific Racism and Discrimination

Indigenous Peoples fully express and exercise their distinct rights, and enjoy living in B.C. without interpersonal, systemic and institutional interference, oppression or other inequities associated with Indigenous-specific racism and discrimination, wherever they reside.



Social, Cultural and Economic Well-Being

Indigenous Peoples in B.C. fully enjoy and exercise their distinct rights to maintain, control, develop, protect and transmit their cultural heritage, traditional knowledge, languages, food systems, sciences and technologies. They are supported by initiatives that promote connection, development, access and improvement, as well as full participation in all aspects of B.C.'s economy. This includes particular focus on ensuring the rights of Indigenous women, youth, Elders, children, persons with disabilities and 2SLGBTQQIA+ people are upheld
