5. Grants

As part of the **BC Provincial Government one-time grant in 2022**, we have spent some of the funds as follows:

1. Computer upgrades.

As part of a planned upgrade to 4 of the public computers, 4 new desktops were purchased and installed. (see photo with Jason and Taylor). The 4 old ones outlived their ability to serve the public in a reliable manner as the demand on them was quite intense. The 4 new ones are very compact and take up much less space on the public computer user's desk area.

Of the four old ones:

1 = not working and will be used as spare parts

2 = will be repurposed as an in-library OPAC (online public access catalogue). The OPACS have less usage than public computers and have lower capacity requirements, as well the current ones are very old and definitely in need of replacement.

1 = repurposed as public print server. Old one overdue for replacement. The public print server allows the public to send print jobs to the photocopier.



2. First Aid Training

On October 19, 2022, we shut the library down for the day and trained 16 people, both staff and some volunteers, in all day long first aid training. Training was done by local company BC First Aid and followed the St John's ambulance training program. We at least are a bit more prepared to help our patrons when incidents occur in our library faciality and just outside the library – as they sometimes do.

This first aid training was offered (for free) to all volunteers at the Pender Harbour Reading Center as well.






10. National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

The library staff honored this day, September 30, with a thoughtful book display and of course, orange t-shirt.





We also had Capilano University librarians come and learn about the First nations collection we have in the library. The display on the shelves by the reference desk is non-fiction and the fiction of spread through the rest of the library. All are marked with the beautiful and artistic first nations spine label.

11. Elder College

We partnered with Elder College this September and Jason, our technology education coordinator, presented a two part "Technology 101" class (free) in our community room for Elder College students. Some of our staff trial tested the 2- part course and worked with Jason on content evaluation. Jason did a great job teaching this course.

12. Capilano University Librarians Visit

On October 3, four Capilano University <u>l</u>ibrarians from both the Sunshine Coast campus and North Vancouver campus came to Sechelt Library to meet our staff, tour Sechelt Library and have a chit chat. The current Capilano University Sunshine Coast Campus does not have a library on their premises but there is a library in North Vancouver. Cap U librarians are concerned that their students don't know how to use the CAP U library catalogue and want our help in training any CAP U students that come into the Sechelt Library facility. One CAP U student we assisted a few weeks ago didn't even know that CAP U had a library... So, not to do what should be their own job of marketing their services to their students, what we can do is have an overview of the CAP U library catalogue so that, if a CAPU U student comes into the Sechelt library, we can show that student how to use the CAP U catalogue – as well as assist that student in any way as we would normally do. Two of our reference staff are scheduled to have a brief overview of the CAP U catalogue with a CAP U librarian in November.



13. Display Upgrades

We designed (on paper) a more professional way to display signage and brochures and then had our amazing carpenter, Rob Williams, make them for us. The wooden signage holders come apart (just the top) for easy exchange of signage. The new brochure displays utilized some plastic holder rejects which I took from the Seaside Center when they threw them out. Rob just put the plastic part on a wooden base for us.





14. Public Advocacy for Libraries

Dear BC Library Community,

Part of BCLA's mission is to advocate for libraries and library workers, and your membership makes it possible for us to do this work. As I shared in my email of June 13, the <u>BC Public Library Partners</u> (made up of representatives from BCLA, BC Libraries Coop, BCLTA, and ABCPLD) presented to the BC Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services on June 7, asking the province to permanently increase annual funding for public libraries to \$23 million in 2023, and commit to inflationary adjustments every year.

I'm happy to share that the Select Standing Committee's <u>Report on the 2023 Budget Consultation</u> is out, and it includes the following recommendation on page 31: "Increase the annual operating grant for public libraries, linked to inflation, and provide targeted financial support for libraries in rural, remote, and Indigenous communities to increase access in these areas."

This recommendation does not mean the increase will be provided, as the Select Standing Committee does not set the budget and has made similar recommendations in past years, but it is a good sign that an increase is supported, and we were pleased to see that they included the need for ongoing increases linked to inflation as that was not included in their previous recommendations.

I've provided a few relevant quotes from the report below:

From the Executive Summary, page 7: "With respect to public libraries, Committee
Members recognize their role as community hubs and centres for information, literacy,
and creativity and support increased funding with particular attention to libraries in
rural, remote, and Indigenous communities."
☐ The PUBLIC LIBRARIES subsection, pages 28-9 of the Arts, Libraries, and Sport
section of the report,: "Several library boards and associations recommended increasing
the funding of public libraries to \$23 million dollars annually with ongoing incremental
increases. These libraries and organizations noted the importance of libraries as
community hubs and referenced increasing costs of operating, staffing, and providing
physical and digital collections."
☐ From the Conclusion, page 30 of the Arts, Libraries, and Sport section of the
report: "Committee Members recognized the changing role of public libraries as
community hubs and centres for literacy, creativity, diversity, and innovation. Further,
they highlighted the important role libraries played during the pandemic and heat dome
and discussed how libraries have been flexible in addressing community needs.
Members agreed that libraries must be supported with adequate funding as they serve
as equalizers – providing services, resources, connectivity, and entertainment to those
who may not have access otherwise, especially in rural, remote, and Indigenous
communities."

The Partners will be continuing our advocacy at the UBCM Convention in September, doing a morning presentation on libraries at the convention and holding an open house at the Whistler Public Library.

Thank you for the work you do in libraries throughout BC every day – it is noticed and appreciated in your communities, and it the impact you have is the reason our advocacy is being well received.

He remained at the event for about 45 minutes, so much longer than had been scheduled that his handlers eventually gave up trying to move him on to his next commitment!

The event organizers did a great job of showcasing public libraries for UBCM attendees.

I am sure many of you are listening to Minister Cullen present at UBCM, but just in case you missed it, Minister Cullen just stated the following, "Don't piss off librarians!" He also talked at length about the amazing work libraries do.

Thank you to all of you for the work you have done to advocate for public libraries.

Leianne's partial translation of his speech:

"Speaking of money, I'm also the minister of libraries. Not another country but fun fact anyways, the only aspect of the Patriot Act that was ever changed was the part of it that said that librarians had to give up your borrowing record to the US federal government. Listen, don't piss off librarians. They are sometimes quiet, sometimes humble, but backed into a corner they are fierce. So, last year we put in \$8m to libraries across the province, on top of what we normally do. And, as one librarian said to me, "if you think education is expensive, try ignorance". We need an informed, and engaged and intelligent population.... Libaries ain't places you just go borrow books from anymore....they have become so much more. They are heating centres, cooling centres, social justice centres, counteracting the plague of the google search, they will find out truth from fiction ,truth from the noise.... "

15. Strategic Initiatives Fund

Initial email from Association for BC Public Library Directors (ABCPLD) to give you a better background of this project and its purpose:

Background

Since its founding, ABCPLD has held advocacy as key to its mission. In 2009, when Public Libraries' Provincial Library Grant was drastically cut, ABCPLD began working with sector partners to lobby for restoration of funding levels. Most recently, ABCPLD has worked with the BC Public Library Partners to build direct relationships with the Provincial government and increase awareness of the incredible value Public Libraries provide to communities across BC.

That work has resulted in countless tangible and intangible benefits - most recently, a productive relationship with Minister Nathan Cullen as well as two rounds of one-time funding amounting to \$11M. Despite all of our efforts, however, the base grant for public libraries has not shifted.

Over the past year, it has become clear that BC Public Library Partners' advocacy for sustained, increased funding would benefit from the support of government relations experts who can help us develop a strategy to move the needle and make headway with our lobbying efforts.

Creation of the Strategic Initiatives Fund

At the 2022 AGM, ABCPLD Members discussed the need to shift our advocacy approach by engaging a government relations consultant to provide Partners with the expertise to achieve results. Members raised and passed a motion to establish a Strategic Initiatives Fund to provide ABCPLD with the ability to move forward with that work quickly.

Since the AGM, ABCPLD has engaged in conversations with stakeholders from around the province to

hear thoughts about engaging a dedicated consultant, gather ideas on how to fund this work, and learn about challenges this project could face.

Based on those conversations, the Board has approved the creation of a Strategic Initiatives Fund dedicated to support Provincial Government Advocacy and is working to raise funds from membership to further our shared goal to achieve higher, sustainable provincial funding.

Details

In working on this project, ABCPLD aims to be as transparent as possible. Key details follow:

- This Provincial Advocacy Project is a multi-year project that will span 2 or 3 years.
- Monies raised will support Provincial Funding Advocacy and will not go to core operations.
- A consultant will be engaged to provide expertise with Government Relations.
- The project will likely incur a cost of \$50-60K / year; we will therefore aim to raise \$150-180K.
- Some libraries will want to contribute all in one year; others will want to provide annual contributions. ABCPLD will be as flexible as possible.

In some early conversations with members, there was a request to develop recommended funding contributions based on library size and population served. Working from conversations, the Board has approved the following:

Recommended Contributions by Population Served

Below <5,000 served – As possible 5,001-10,000 served – Up to 1K 10,001-40,000 served – 1K-4K 40,001-195,000 served – 4K-10K 195,001+ served – 10K-20K

Strategic Initiative Update

We've received enthusiastic responses from ABCPLD members to our campaign to raise funds for the Advocacy Strategic Initiative. We have received over \$148,000 in commitments already from a range of libraries - small to large, rural to urban. The full list of contributing members includes:


Note from Leianne:
