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### 1. Cover Photo

Sechelt Library hosted two school tours with French students from Ecole du Pacifique on Thursday Jan 12, 2023. The first tour was students in grades 4 and 5 and the second tour grades 6 and 7. Our Children's Programmer, Charlotte, had the students go on a library scavenger hunt and did a great job showing them our library resources. Many of them did not yet have a library card but membership forms went out to all of them. # 2. New Minister of Municipal Affairs

Libraries currently fall under the Minister of Municipal Affairs. Our new Minister is Anne Kang (MLA for Burnaby-Deer Lake) and she was named Minister of Municipal Affairs in the Eby ministry on December 7, 2022. She was also a former City of Burnaby councilor, and was a Burnaby Library Board rep for a while during her tenure.

# 4. Budget Meetings

#### **SCRD**:

The SCRD 2023 Budget schedule was and is as follows:

Budget Round 1 – January 23-25, 2023 (we presented)

Budget Round 2 – February 21-22, 2023

Budget Final Adoption – March 23, 2023

We submitted our budget documentation on January 6, 2023 to the SCRD. Both Pat Harvey and myself spoke in person at the budget round 1 meeting and we were very grateful to have had the support of the rest of the Board Members and staff at the meeting.

#### SCRD Round 1 Decision:

A suggestion was made by Director Backs to, instead of giving us the 9% we were requesting (and saying he was not sure why we asked for it) maybe we should be given at least a 6-7% inflationary increase. (Note: we clearly articulated in the report why we asked for it). A motion was then re-worded by Director Toth (which did not actually match what Director Backs had said) of: A motion to refer to Round 2 pending receipt of additional information from the library justifying a greater than inflationary increase. There was no seconder. So, it went back to the library having to stick to their funding agreement of 3%.

Gibsons Library has been asked to come back to Round 2 with the implication of a reduction from their 13% increase request (disputed as 9% by GDPL) to a 6% inflationary increase.

This SCRD voting process and the decision that followed will be further discussed in the Library Board Meeting (in camera).

#### District of Sechelt:

It has been suggested that we present in early February at an in-camera meeting but this has yet to be confirmed with DOS staff.

#### 5. Grants

As part of the **BC Provincial Government one-time grant in 2022**, we have now spent some of the funds on capital purchases as follows:

- 1. New computers for 4 public stations
- 2. First Aid Training (already put to use as one staff member was choking and one literally saved her)
- 3. 2 portable First Aid Kits for any staff member who goes off site for programming or library business
- 4. 7 new public computer keyboards (old ones were losing the white color on the keys)
- 5. 3 new IPads for children's and technology programming

We are considering how best to spend the additional government one-time funding – not meant for operational concerns – only capital costs. Another likely choice is to allocate funds towards improving the functionality and storage of the kitchen space. If you've been in the kitchen – you would probably agree with this option!



options, says Health Canada.

Another item under consideration for us is an indoor carbon dioxide tester.

Higher indoor carbon dioxide levels — and less fresh oxygen getting in — can lead to a higher risk of airborne infections. Poor air quality can lead to fatigue, headaches and a sore throat. Under 600 parts per million is considered excellent, while more than 1,000 is poor. Ways to improve ventilation include opening a window, making sure fuel-burning appliances are properly vented, and considering mechanical ventilation

Two libraries on the north shore currently have a few in circulation – with many many holds currently placed on them. According to one library: "We're recognizing the library has a role in some more expensive tools, items, pieces of equipment ... It's giving people an opportunity to test these things if they can't afford it, or if they want to test it before they buy it."

# 6. SCRD and District of Sechelt Tour / Orientation to Sechelt Library

#### District of Sechelt:

Councilor Adam Shephard, our Sechelt Library Liaison and Councilor Alton Toth, our alternate liaison, and are scheduled for tour of the library on **Wednesday January 25, 2023 at 6pm**.

Mayor Henderson will lily be coming for a tour as well along with other DOS councilors at some point in the future.

#### SCRD:

After an invitation from Sechelt Library, Directors Justine Gabias (Area B) and Kelly Backs (Area D) were happy to come for library orientation/tour on Monday January 12<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm. Rhian Piprell joined us.

Director Gabias advised she is the appointed representative to the SPL with Director Leonard Lee being the alternate.



### 7. FIFA Contest for Patrons

Jeff set up a FIFA contest along with a sports book display during the FIFA world Cup. One lucky patron was a prize!



# 8. Therapy Dog Training

November's cover photo was of "Star", a certified St. Johns Ambulance therapy dog, being read a story by one of our young patrons. These certified dogs are extensively trained prior to certification. To aid in the training process for professional certification, we will be hosting a group of "hopeful" therapy dogs both for St. Johns Ambulance Therapy Dogs and Therapy Dogs of Canada. They were in the library between 8:30 and 9:30 am on Tuesday January 24th and all training will be conducted prior to the public entering at 10:00am.



# 9. Library Inventory

Our entire staff worked on the inventory project over the three days of Wednesday December 28 - to Friday December 30. It took the entire 3 days to do the inventory. 100's of anomalies were found with shelving location and cataloguing issues - and remedied. Final inventory reports are being done right now which will require further actions.

The Sechelt Library had not undergone an inventory reconciliation since the library moved to the current location in 1996.







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# 10. The Great Library Weed

We are continuing with our massively time-consuming but massively necessary "weeding" of all library items. As at January  $20^{th}$ , we are about 1/4 to 1/3 completed.

Our first priority for donations are for Shorncliff, Totem Lodge, Sechelt Hospital and the Sunshine Coast Hospice. All remaining books have been placed on shelving carts in the lobby for any patron to take home for free – and they love that! This past week there has been much discussion amongst BC library Directors about what to do with weeded books and many seem to be simply destroying them. I think this is a shame as there are so many useful places to donate to. It just takes time and effort.

# Get to know the Sechelt Public Library

Over 32 years ago, the small original library building in Sechelt was staffed with one full-time and two part-time employees that were helped by many volunteers.

Books (and some cassettes) were the only items on the shelves while a DOS-based computer served the entire library's needs.

Staff physically searched through a card catalogue to find books.

Today, the Sechelt Public Library sits adjacent to the Sechelt Aquatic Centre and has 14 full-time, part-time and casual staff and, still, many invaluable volunteers.

Over 45,000 books adom the shelves but the cassettes, since replaced with CDs, are almost gone.

The library provides a variety of in-house and lendable computers, laptops and tablets.

They have replaced any need for the card catalogue – which is now a much sought-after antique piece.

What has not changed is that when someone wants to know something, they still call a library.

It is a trusted go-to source for almost everything.

Every staff member at the SPL strives to be professional and are passionate about making a positive difference in people's daily lives.

The many programs and events, unique services, books and other interesting library items are all free.

A library's impact is boosted even more when partnered with community organizations.

In the Sunshine Coast Literacy Coalition, the library enjoys a joint membership with the Pender Harbour Community School while many of our "Books for Babies" bags were sent to the Pender Harbour Health Centre for distribution to new parents in the community.

For some time now, the library has enjoyed a good working relationship with Karen Dyck and her team at the Pender Harbour Reading Centre.

The two groups have collaborated on many things including COVID rules, protocols, Wi-Fi sharing areas, Wi-Fi funding, marketing and promotion for PHRC fundraisers, summer reading club, memberships, free "Books for Babies" and a weekly courier service between Sechelt Library and the reading centre for items.

With a Sechelt library card, Area A residents can have the following items from the Sechelt Library collection sent up to the reading centre, and delivered back as well:

- Books, large print books, audiobooks, paperbacks, CDs, DVDs, graphic novels and magazines from our collection;
- Popular surprise packages full of books that we personally choose for the PHRC. and
- The "Books for Babies" package for those who had a baby in 2022.

Of course, we'd love for more upper Coast residents to come into the library and take part in activities, personal one-on-one services (like technology assistance and accessibility assistance), use our free genealogical databases for or be tempted by the many incredible items we have on display, including ukuleles, STEAM kits, radon detection kits, Samsung tablets or Brain Games.

Did you know that you can also officially designate someone on your library card to pick up items for you?

Even from your home and with just a simple library card, you can read or listen to books online (Library2Go), enjoy newspapers and magazines from around the world (Press Reader), learn another language (Mango), find French language books (Bibliotèque Numérique), take online courses (Gale and Linked-In Learning), read and research from BC historical newspapers and much more.

As a public library association, we are governed by a board of directors that for 2022 included Leonard Lee, SCRD Area A director, as a representative on our library board.

The Sechelt Library serves a population of about 20,000 people between Egmont and Sechelt.


Director's Report

## 13. Literacy Coalition Activities

Sechelt Public Library, as an active member of the Sunshine Literacy Coalition, is still involved with the ongoing planning and execution of many activities for 2023. Here are some of the current and upcoming projects:

### Family Literacy Day Event – Friday January 27th 2023:

Rick Scott will be performing for two kids concerts during the day on Friday January 27, 2023 at the Roberts Creek Hall. Both concerts are fully booked! The Literacy Coalition will be organizing and providing food and drink as well. Sechelt Library has also done all the marketing and advertising posters and other members will send to Coast Reporter and other places for distribution. Both Charlotte and I will be working at the Robert Creek hall this Friday afternoon for the 4:00 concert.



#### Gift baskets for child care Centers:

Music, Puppets and books have been put into nice baskets and delivered to all the Child Education Centers and Daycares on the Sunshine Coast (30+). Everything was chosen, ordered, put together and delivered by Literacy Coalition members.


#### **Books for Babies 2022:**

The Books for Babies program recognizes the importance of reading to children at a young age and keeping them in book rich environment. The program helps turn families into readers and library users. Sechelt Library put together 100 books for babies bags which included a book, CD, downloadable music RFID and marketing materials for Sechelt Library. We have shared our packages with the Pender Harbour Health Centre, the Sechelt Health Center and, of course, have them available in the Sechelt Library. At this moment, we only have 5 bags remaining and everyone seems to be very excited – and grateful – in receiving them. We will have new choices and packages for 2023 as well (I'm assuming!).

In the SCRD Budget Round 1 negotiations on January 23, 2023, I did highlight the work that Rhian Piprell did over 15 years ago, along with Premier Gordon Campbell in creating this Books for Babies Program. Two of Rhian's previous staff members were actually the ones that created the unique otter artwork that still remains as the theme. A great legacy to be very proud of – thanks Rhian!



Although not a "Literacy Coalition" project – Gibsons and Sechelt Library designed a joint advertisement for the Coast reporter to celebrate Literacy Week. It should be out this Friday.



# 14. Scanning Pens – Accessibility Option?



It is important to note that we take our role seriously with regards to Accessibility. Not only are we having to introduce a huge reporting structure mandated by the accessibility Act of BC (discussed at length in a previous Board Report) but we want to include items in our Sechelt Library circulation that benefit patrons with accessibility issues. Daisy Readers are one such example – and we have just ordered two more – utilizing grant money.

At the time of writing of the last Board Report, we were undergoing staff and patron testing and evaluation on two types of Scanning Pens to see if these might be viable options for the Sechelt Library as part of our specialized circulation items. The C Pen are basically used for scanning book text and offering an audio capture of that text. The lingo Pen is used the same way but converts English to the language in the audio to the language of your choice. After Jason and Janette studied and trialed it internally, Janette trialed extensively with multiple library patrons with differing accessibility issues (ADHD, cognitive, visual, aphasia, learning, etc.) and put together some great feedback – which we shared with the C Pen company.

Although in the end we choose not to purchase and add to the library collection, it is important to note the extra work our staff do in wanting to offer the best to our patrons.


