5. Budget Meetings

SCRD:

The SCRD 2023 Budget schedule was and is as follows:

Budget Round 1 – January 23-25, 2023

- we submitted our budget documentation on January 6, 2023
- Pat Harvey and Leianne spoke in person at the budget round 1 meeting on January 23. We were very grateful to have had the support of the rest of the Board Members and staff at the meeting.
- SCRD Round 1 Decision:
 - For the Youtube presentation and the SCRD's discussion regarding our budget request, please start watching at the 3:58 mark. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Ij5m7-nPihM
 - O A suggestion was made by Director Backs to, instead of giving us the 9% we were requesting (and saying he was not sure why we asked for it) maybe we should be given at least a 6-7% inflationary increase. (Note: we did articulate in the report why we asked for it). A motion was then re-worded by Director Toth (which did not actually match what Director Backs had said) of: A motion to refer to Round 2 pending receipt of additional information from the library justifying a greater than inflationary increase. There was no seconder. So, it went back to the library having to stick to their funding agreement of 3%.
 - Gibsons Library has been asked to come back to Round 2 with the implication of a reduction from their 13% increase request (disputed as 9% by GDPL) to a 6% inflationary increase.
 Gibsons Library extremely frustrated by this direction
 - The SCRD Round 1 decision was discussed in camera at the Library Board Meeting Jan 25

Budget Round 2 – now moved from February 21-22, 2023 to March 2, 2023

- We were not asked to come back to Round 2
- Gibsons Library will be presenting at Round 2

Budget Final Adoption – March 23, 2023

District of Sechelt:

- Our budget submission (altered from the submission given to the SCRD) was given to the District of Sechelt on January 26
- I gave a speech at the Committee of the Whole Meeting on February 1st.
- Many great questions were asked by the DOS council.
- The presence of the Library Board and two of our staff were an incredible show of support and positive addition to our request.

Summary:

At this point, and after some comments were made in the DOS budget request, I think there is a possibility of opening the funding agreement – and perhaps outside of the budget process.

It is very important to note that we are not considering requesting anything less than our original 9%. Our budget is already bare bones and there is no room for less of a request. Based on responsible management and fiscal responsibility our original request is what we need.

6. Annual General Meeting – Sechelt Public Library

The Sechelt Library Annual General Meeting will be held on Wednesday March 29, 2023 (followed by the regular Library Board Meeting)

- There is one additional position available for a new Board Member
- Nomination packages were sent out to each Board Member for use in recruitment and are also available for pickup at the library (in the Board Folder)
- The AGM advertising will be sent the Coast Reporter for publication in the March 3 edition

7. Community Room Closure

Community Room will be closed for both the DOS and the Library the week of March 27 – March 31 for work on upgrades to the sound and technology systems. Most of our programs cannot be accommodated elsewhere so we will be adjusting our programs for this week accordingly.

An update from Leigh Ann Palmer to our ABCPLD Group:

January 18, 2023

The <u>BC Public Library Partners</u> are pleased to share that we have begun a new multiyear advocacy initiative. The Partners are working with a government relations firm to secure increased, ongoing provincial funding for British Columbia public libraries and to develop the Partners' understanding and capacity for strategic provincial advocacy. Since a 25% cut in 2009, provincial funding has been largely frozen. During that time, costs have skyrocketed, population has grown, and complex service demands have increased.

BC's 71 public libraries, with 250 locations, serve as critical social infrastructure. These free and inclusive hubs provide all British Columbians with learning, programs, and connections. With over 60 million visits per year, they make life more affordable for families, contribute to building a strong future-facing workforce, and help create safer communities by providing at-risk individuals with a welcoming space to access services and better their lives.

In 2022, Public Libraries received ~\$14M. Without a substantial increase in funding, they will be forced to further reduce operational costs and cut services. With adequate provincial funding, BC public libraries will be able to meet the existing needs of their communities and effectively scale when needs arise.

The Partners want to acknowledge and thank the many public libraries and their boards that provided the financial support to make this initiative possible.

We look forward to working with you to advocate for the ongoing funding public libraries need.

9. BC Provincial – One Time Grant 2022

As part of the BC Provincial Government one-time (non-operational) grant in 2022, we have now spent some of the funds on capital purchases. It is important to note that NONE of these capital items would have been covered by the funding from our funding partners. These items are not part of an operational budget – so without the grant we would not have them.

- 1. Glass removal for COVID related front desk glass
- 2. New computers for 4 public stations
- 3. First Aid Training (already put to use as one staff member was choking and one literally saved her)
- 4. 2 portable First Aid Kits for any staff member who goes off site for programming or library business
- 5. 7 new public computer keyboards (old ones were losing the white color on the keys)
- 6. 3 new IPads for children's and technology programming
- 7. Face Masks

8. 2 x Daisy Readers and cases (demand for this type of accessibility hardware tool is becoming greater than our current supply for circulation loan is)



9. 2 x Co2 monitors (we decided to purchase two for circulation and are still working on how best to package, process and catalogue)



10. Air Purifiers

We have purchased 5 of the following air purifiers for the library. 3 are located in the public area (see public area photos below) and two are in the staff areas. The public area also has ceiling fans to circulate air as well.

Blue Air brand air purifiers.

These are Consumer Reports recommended air purifiers designed for large areas and are considered very good at handling dust. We were able to test one thanks to the District of Sechelt and based on our experience and the findings by Consumer Reports we decided to purchase them.

They are a three-stage filter design, there is a machine washable outer filter to catch the larger particulate before the air passes to the main filter and then a charcoal filter is present to eliminate any odor. The main and charcoal filters are replaceable and are expected to last one year of use. The unit has three stages of operation and at the lower stage will produce ~35 decibels of noise or

roughly the level of a whisper. At max operation it will produce ~56 decibels or the amount of noise you would get in a quiet office.

The units also capture 99% of PM 2.5 airborne pollutants; allergies, mold, dust, pet dander, smoke and pollen with specially designed particle filter








10. In our Library - Freedom To Read Week


Intellectual Freedom is the right to read, view, hear, express, and discuss any idea on any subject.

Sechelt Library did have a Seed Exchange set up in the library last year but we decided to make some improvements this year – significant ones – to make it a more permanent structure with much presence. Originally set up by Irene Bremer, head of Sechelt Seed Sharing Library and a member of the Sunshine Coast Seed Collective, she is passionate about community gardening and seed exchange. Jessica has volunteered to work with her as the Library representative on the 2023 Seed Exchange Program. We are also fine tuning the paperwork, documents and process to make it easier and more understandable for the patrons who will be using it.

The funding is coming from the Friends of the Library – thankyou Friends!

Jessica and I purchased the base at the Restore in Sechelt and our wonderful and talented carpenter Rob Williams modified it to become our new Seed Exchange. Jessica and I are still working through the design of the labels and paperwork flow and we are wanting to have it ready for a seed-oriented programing event – just planned for March 3 and 4. 

Director's Report



Over the next few Directors Reports, I will be writing a Library 101" section in each report. When I think we have covered enough information it will be put into a "Library 101" standalone document.

In this Directors Report we will cover what Act governs our Library and the different types of libraries.

LIBRARY ACT

- The Library Act is the provincial public library statute and applies to public libraries only
- It was last revised in 2018 and provides for:
 - o the establishment and operation of library boards
 - o mandates free basic library service
 - o authorizes the provision of provincial grants for public library purposes.
- Public libraries share a common mandate under the Act for borrowing to be free of charge to residents of a library service area.

TYPES OF PUBLIC LIBRARIES

- British Columbia public libraries are established under the authority of the Library Act.
- The Act allows for the creation (and continuation) of several types of libraries.
- Libraries are led by locally established, autonomous boards as legislated by the Act.
- Each community determines the type of library system.
- There are four types of public libraries:
 - Municipal
 - o Regional library districts
 - Public library associations
 - o Integrated public library systems.

Municipal Libraries

Municipal libraries are established by a municipality under section 3. Library board members are appointed by the municipality.

Regional District Libraries

Regional libraries are established when two or more municipalities and one or more regional districts form an agreement, under section 4. These boards are made up of regional and municipal elected representatives from participating local governments.

Public Library Associations

Public Library Associations (PLAs) are a historic type of library that are recognized by section 31 and represent the majority of libraries. Library board members are elected from among the members of the PLAs and may also consist of elected local government officials. The Act no longer permits the creation of these types of libraries.

Integrated Library Systems

Integrated library systems are a historic type of library that are recognized by section 60 and exist only in the Cariboo and Thompson-Nicola Regional Districts. These systems are departments within their regional districts. The Act no longer permits the creation of these types of libraries.
