

# Director's Report Sechelt Public Library March 30, 2023 – April 26, 2023 By Leianne Emery

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## 1. Cover Photo

The cover photo is of a DAISY (Digital Accessible Information System) Audio Player (with cover on), made by Humanware. This particular one is very special, but I'll get to that later...

DAISY Audio Players are designed specifically for people with little or no vision, people who have manual dexterity issues or other cognitive challenges. They feature large, tactile, high-contrast keys, easy navigation buttons (especially with compatible DAISY Cds), pre-programmed sleep time options and has bookmarking abilities. These players also play regular MP3 CDs and music CDs. They have built-in text-to-speech capability so you can even "play" text documents which have been saved on external media (e.g. flash drives and SD cards). It's also very portable, holds a charge for up to 10 hours, has excellent sound and is very durable.

Janette works directly with patrons to determine if this is the right thing for themselves or their loved one in relation to their accessibility challenges. She conducts very personalized one-on-one appointments with patrons and explains the services available and technical aspects of the players. She also works with the Center for Equitable Library Access (CELA) to assist patrons with obtaining DAISY formatted audio CDs which can be downloaded and pre-programmed into the DAISY reader. This has the added benefit of allowing patrons who do not have internet access to still use the service and player. Patrons can also use physical CDs which Janette selects for them and obtains from CELA on their behalf. Among the unique features of these DAISY formatted CDs, one book is contained on one disk (much easier for patrons to handle) and they allow for a more personalized navigation experience by phrase or chapter.

We have been able to grow the number of DAISY readers we can offer to our patrons over the last couple of years due to grants available. Sechelt Library now has 6 in our collection (about \$650 each).

So back to the photo... This one is special. Malcolm Ingram, a patron at Sechelt Library for many years, just passed way but specifically wanted his well-loved DAISY player to be donated to the Sechelt Library. Many years ago, we initially worked with Malcolm on navigating the technology and service and helped him to gain independence in his reading choices and reading ability. A DAISY player can be a lifeline, as Malcolm described it, for someone whose accessibility needs require something other than physical books or regular audio CDs. As we keep hearing stories from our patrons and their families, we realize the immense impact that libraries, their services and their staff have on patrons that use them. We just had the label printed and put on the DAISY cover, so that Malcolm's generosity will always be recognized.

## 3. shishálh Nation announcement

We wish to acknowledge our shishálh Nation neighbors' recent discovery and announcement with regards to the unmarked graves found on the former Sechelt residential school land. Many of our staff are wearing their orange t-shirts and we put up a simple and honorable display in the library of the orange, t-shirt, a children's chair and article from the papers.

Our First Nations collection (non-fiction) currently holds 33 physical books on the subject matter of residential schools and that count climbs to 85 throughout the library with physical books, DVDs and audio. E-books and e-audio adds another almost 50. There has been an increased interest in the First Nations section in general over the last year with many sensitive questions asked of our reference staff.

We write to you today to inform you of the results of the Ground Penetrating Radar Investigation of the former Indian Residential School site that was on the lands of the shishalh Nation.

This is a very challenging time for all the Survivors who attended the institution, families of students, and communities, and for the shishalh Nation. Our focus throughout the upcoming community meetings will be on supporting Survivors, community members and staff through sacred ceremony and cultural practices.

It should be made clear that the results of the St. Augustine's field investigations should in no way be seen to validate or invalidate the experiences of Survivors, or the knowledge held by families of those who attended. Whether or not unmarked graves are found, there is enough documented oral and archival evidence to say that these burials do or did exist.

The news of unmarked graves at Residential Schools across Canada have been deeply painful and incredibly challenging for shishalh people and for all Indigenous peoples across Canada. The truth is being heard by many settler Canadians in new ways, information Indigenous peoples have been telling Canadians for generations. There are many more truths that will be heard in the coming months. It is a horrifying and devasting history that must be grappled with.

This is an important time of reckoning for Canada, a time where history must be examined, current inequities scrutinized, and a fundamentally new path chartered. We must find a path

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towards truth, justice, and unity. This new path will require great change for all of us. It requires individuals and collectives to re-examine their place in Canadian society and how they are contributing to or hindering a more equitable future. This change will be hard, growth often is. The honourable Jody Wilson-Raybould recently reminded us of Chief Joe Mathias's words, "Behold the turtle, he moves forward when he sticks his head out." It is time for bold actions, actions that shifts our reality, actions that push us to grow, actions that shift our hearts. Shishalh has continued to show Canadians how when our hearts and minds are in the right place change can happen quickly.

### 5. Newly Announced One-Time BC Provincial Grants

We responded to some questions the Sechelt Council had for us on the BC Provincial \$45M one-time funding announcement for libraries. Here is a summary...

#### Not to Replace Local Government Funding

First and foremost, the BC Province has made it clear that the **one-time enhancement grant funding** given to libraries in 2023 is <u>not to replace</u> any local government funding given to libraries each year for operations. The Libraries Branch of the BC Provincial government will be sending out letters to that effect to ensure no local government (ie. DOS, SCRD, SIGD) is confused by this.

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#### \$45M BC Government Enhancement Grant breakdown:

Please note that the \$45M awarded to libraries as per the BC Province recent announcement, is actually made up of several components and given to various organizations. Only 28% of that \$45M was given directly to libraries in an enhancement grant. Here is how it is actually made up:

\$12.4M - for regular ongoing operational funding normally given to all libraries each year (already included in our operating budget)

\$12.5M - for one-time enhancement funding for 71 public libraries - proportionately distributed. Please note that this represents **only 28% of the \$45M.** 

\$ 4.1M - for library federations

<u>\$16.0M</u> - for library service partners

\$45.0M - total

#### Where did the BC Government get the funds?

The BC Government had a surplus for their fiscal 2022/2023 year-end. They HAD to allocate surplus and have distributed by the end of March 2023 to get off 2022/2023 books. This surplus is also where the DOS grant of \$3.7M and the SCRD grant of \$2.2M came from.

#### What is the enhancement grant portion allocated directly to Sechelt Library?

Out of the \$12.5 M one-time enhancement grant funds allocated, the Sechelt Library was allocated \$130,565.19 in a one-time enhancement grant which is to be spent over three years.

#### What will the Funds be Used for? :

Whenever we receive grants - of any kind - we use them for items not covered in our regular operating budget. Our regular operating budget is very limited in scope. If we need any items such as shelving, computers, desks, keyboards, paint on destroyed walls, a new book cart, STEAM kits, ukuleles, phones, COVID glass removed, first aid training, ongoing chair yoga, IPADs for programming, masks for staff and public, daisy readers for accessibility patrons, etc... - we have to either apply and receive a grant or ask our funders for one-time funding.

When the province gives us a grant, typically they will service the needs or goals of the provinces - not the library. I say that because all BC libraries, federations and library service partners have been <u>fiercely</u> advocating to the BC Government for ongoing operational funding (to reduce the onus on local governments) - not one-time grants. But what do we get? One-time grants. That being said, we will use this 2023 one time grant to <u>enhance</u> what is <u>not</u> already included in our regular operating budget - but that will also serve the strategic goals of the province (Improving access for British Columbians, Building capacity, Advancing citizen engagement, Enhancing governance)

#### What that will likely, but not definitively, translate to for SPL is:

Eg. adding extra hours for our part-time adult programmer (as I could not afford to include in our original budget request to the funding partners)

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Eg. paying for physical changes we will have to make to accommodate accessibility regulations and issues already identified (also not paid for in operational budget)

Eg. paying for renovation changes we will need to make in the library when Phase 1 of DOS/Library building renovation is done (additional electrical, floor level changes, moving and temporarily storing books etc.(not included in operation budget)

### 6. BC Provincial Reporting

As part of our ongoing operational BC Government grant receipt each year, we have many official reporting requirements. They are very time consuming but must be done.

Due Mar 1 - Public Library Grant Report (completed)

Due May 15 - Statement of Financial Information (ready to submit)

Due May 15 - Annual Survey and Statistical Reporting (ready to submit)

## 7. Budget Requests and Funding and Service Agreement

As to next steps in this process, we recently sent out an email to all funders as per the following

#### April 21, 2023

#### Funders of the Sechelt Public Library,

Our special request for additional funds this year, made necessary due to unanticipated staffing costs, made it much more challenging for all parties involved. Thank-you for all your efforts and considerations throughout the 2023 budget season as we value and appreciate the financial contributions each of you make, every year, to the ongoing operational costs of the Sechelt Public Library. We are proud that our library continues to be a great community asset that benefits so many people in the communities you serve on the Sunshine Coast.

## Here is what Sechelt Library considers next steps in regards to amending the current Funding and Service Agreement:

1. We have created a draft Amendment to the current Funding and Service Agreement which will address the following:

- a. changes made to the 2023 baseline funding levels through council approvals
- b. increases of 3% for 2024 and 3% for 2025 (as per original agreement)
- c. updates to the population census from 2016 population to 2021 population
- for years 2024 and 2025 (as per the original Agreement)

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2. Once we have a definitive vote from SIGD council, we can distribute the Amendment to all parties for review and signature

#### **Renegotiation for Future Agreements beyond 2025**

As per clause 4.3 of the original Funding and Service Agreement, 6 months prior (June 2024) to the expiration of the current Funding and Service Agreement, all parties will meet to discuss renewal of a future funding agreement.

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## 9. Magazine / Computer Area

The main public computer area along with the magazine displays will be undergoing a physical layout change in 2-3 months. The two big issues that make change a necessity are:

- 1. The computer section has so much light pouring in from the large windows making it quite difficult for patrons to see computer screens effectively at almost all computer stations. We get complaints often.
- 2. The magazine section needs to have shelving that allows proper display and marketing of these almost 125 magazines but yet remains flexible for future use if a building expansion takes place. The current shelves are clearly not designed for magazines and really should not have been used.

We have spent much time analyzing what the actual problems are and how best to address them. The staff all had input and are on board with the plan. Downtime, money and future flexibility were also considerations. Friends of the Library will hopefully be financially assisting us with the purchase of three new double-sided rolling shelving units for the magazines (\$18,197). Space is not a friend of the Sechelt Library so we will do our best to maximize this square footage and make it as enjoyable as possible for all patrons.
