3. Budget Requests and Funding and Service Agreement

DOS Update:


At a DOS council meeting on June 7th, the council voted in favor of giving us the full request. We are very grateful.

Funding and Service Agreement:

At the request of the DOS, I created six different excel scenarios for decision making data in regards to the amendment to the Funding and Service Agreement which would apply to the remaining years 2024 and 2025. They look at options of moving the benchmark for all funders in 2023 to 9.19% mark or the

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7% mark, the implications in years to come, two different populations census scenarios (2016 or 2021) and implications for SPL. They also look at the implications and overall percentage contributions for all funders over the 5-year term of the Funding and Service Agreement. Each year has to be calculated separately as the contribution of the SIGD increases slightly each year of the 5-year agreement.



4. Public Library Partners Advocacy to BC Government Funding

Rina Hadziev, BC Library Association (BCLA), wrote:

The BC Public Library Partners, made up of representatives from BCLA, BC Libraries Coop, BCLTA, and ABCPLD, presented to the BC Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services on June 12. Our unified ask was for the Province to permanently increase annual funding for public libraries to \$30 million in 2024, and commit to inflationary adjustments every year.

Our presentations were well received, and we look forward to seeing the Finance Committee's recommendations in late summer/early fall. You can <u>read the transcription</u> or <u>listen to the audio</u> of our presentations and the questions – they are one after the other from 2:48 – 3:45 pm in both versions (there is a presentation from the Association of Book Publishers of BC in the middle).

These presentations are only one aspect of the government advocacy initiative the Partners are working on as we strive to ensure public libraries receive adequate, consistent provincial funding to support their communities, after struggling with frozen funding for over a decade while addressing increasing needs and facing rising expenses.

The Partners are proud to represent and support public libraries throughout BC and the work you do in your libraries every day.

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5. Friends of the Sechelt Library – Book Faires

The amazing volunteers at "Friends of the Library" work tirelessly to put on Book Faires throughout the year and raise funds for "extras" for the Library. The Book Faire on June 2, 3 and 4th raised \$1425. The book faire on June 16-18 raised \$1347.

Heather Till, FOL, designed a document showing all the contributions the FOL has made to the Sechelt Library since 2013. Almost \$140,000 !!! There are many items over the years that were important to the library that could not have purchased as they are not paid for by our funders in the operating budget, or, in historical years, the library was very underfunded – or there was no grant funding applied for and or available. We are grateful to the FOL for working so hard to make these purchases a reality.

We have placed an 11" x 17" poster in the library by the biography section and on the A frame in the lobby (which may change in size to fit the actual opening). There will be a poster at the cash desk at every FOL book sale, and, soon to come, we are creating an in-library display which should be in place at the end of the first week in July and located by the Seed Station.








Sechelt Library honours the long history and rich culture of Canada's Indigenous Peoples.




Blanket woven by Shy Watters - 2019

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


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12. Bookmarks for the Fall

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14. Library Technology Projects

We have three major projects for the upgrading of library technology:

- 1. Router upgrade (completed in June)
- 2. WIFI upgrade (completed in June)
- 3. Server upgrade (planned for July)

Router Upgrade:

Problem (as per Jason):

The Sechelt Public library has, for several years, used a Ubiquiti branded router to handle both the Staff and the Public network. On May 4, 2023 the router experienced an error and corrupted the DCHP system. DHCP is the system that assigns IP addresses to devices on the network, without those IP addresses the network is unable to route traffic. This results in computers, tablets, smart phones, and other devices unable to access the internet, printers, or each other. The issue occurred on the Public network side and Staff were unaffected.

Solution #1:

After determining the issue, the DHCP system was rebuilt and the Public network began to function as expected.

Solution #2:

This event created doubt about the router's future reliability, and the decision was made to replace it. It was determined that installation and configuration of the new router would be a two-person job, and needed to happen after hours when the library was closed. Taylor Howden, who has done tech work for the library for a number of years, was asked to assist.

This project proved to be very challenging – even for two well versed technical people. All components must speak properly to each other (networks, servers, routers, switches) and work together in perfection in order to provide optimum security. Trouble shooting, research, brainstorming, working with the manufacturer and problem solving many different technical issues over three attempts finally proved successful. Our new configuration now has the added benefit of allowing for an additional layer of security as now both systems will automatically reject a new or unknown DHCP server. This is an emerging attack technique used by some groups to gain access to networks.

Funds: Upgrade paid for by the CVITP Grant

WIFI Upgrade:

Problem (as per Jason):

Currently the Sechelt Library offers free Wi-Fi access to our patrons and has a dedicated Wi-Fi network for staff usage. These networks are currently generated by three Ubiquiti Access points, two are mounted in the library itself and one in the staff area. A recent survey of the Wi-Fi connection strength in the library noted several areas where the Wi-Fi signal was either weak or non-existent. As Wi-Fi devices are becoming more and more common this is an issue I feel should be addressed.

Solution (as per Jason):


Replaced the three current access points and added two new ones to ensure adequate Coverage. While it may have possible to only add on the existing network with two new access Points, we chose not to for several reasons:

- The current units are very difficult to manage, this is a known flaw with this model
- The current models are may be unavailable
- The current units are reaching EOL

Funds:

Upgrade paid for by the BC Covid Relief/Emergency Grant
