


Donations to Sechelt Library:

Our current Policy Manual does state that pets are not allowed in the library, but over the last few years, and well before my time here, the directors and staff were lenient. Some cute pets are hard to resist and many of us are animal lovers, but this also led to snakes, security rats and pet chickens. Thus, it is time to enforce our policy



12. Library Technology Projects Planned

Our last remaining upgrade project for 2023 was the server which was nearing its operating system (OS) end of life (EOL). This project was completed in July by Jason and Taylor, our outside tech assistance from time to time. All our upgrade projects are thought out and planned well in advance and we try to have all basis covered. As with everything else, once installed there were small bugs that needed to be worked out but that is to be expected with everything.

As per Jason to me prior to purchase and installation:

Sechelt Server Upgrade Program

The current Sechelt server is running Microsoft Sever 2012 R2, this OS is EOL in October 2023. Prior to that we are looking at upgrading the server to Microsoft Sever 2019. Activation codes for Microsoft server 2019 have already been obtained, as such there should not be a software upgrade cost for the Microsoft side.

Suggested order of operations is:

- Clone existing server to external HDD
- Use Windows Server 2019 installation media to upgrade to new server version
- Apply patches to server
- Test for normal usage

The library server is also used to run a Sage/Simple Accounting server for accounting and payroll purposes. While according to Sage the current version of the software is compatible with Windows Server 2019 care issues may arise. If an upgrade to the new version of Sage50 is required, Sage50 no longer offers stand-alone versions of their software, all versions of Sage 50 are subscription based now. A yearly cost for a new version of the software that the library uses is ~600 to ~850 CAD per year. As it is preferable to avoid yearly costs care should be taken to make sure that the upgrade goes smoothly. If required, reinstallation of Sage50 on the Microsoft Server might be required, this will involve finding the correct login/access codes for Sage50.

Scheduling:

Care must be taken to ensure that the upgrade causes the least amount of disruption. Therefore, the upgrade should be scheduled on a non-payroll week, in case there is an issue with the Sage50 install. The week of July 17 should be preferable to perform the upgrade. This is a non-payroll week, and fits with people available schedules.

To make ready for this event:

- 1. Acquire an external HDD of at least 500GB for cloning purposes
- 2. Find the activation codes for the current edition of Sage50
- 3. Create the installation media for the install

If in the event the upgrade fails, or causes issues that cannot be addressed in a timely manner, the server will be rolled back using the cloned drive to ensure continuation of business while issues are researched and addressed.
