3. Funding and Service Agreement

Progress is being made on completing a workable and updated Funding and Service Agreement. The SNGD population addition made by Census Canada (21 persons now added to the official population count - 744+21 = 765) will now change all the excel calculations made to date, by us, for the funders on prorated contributions.

4. Friends of the Library

The amazing volunteers at "Friends of the Library" (FOL) work tirelessly to put on Book Faires throughout the year and raise funds for "extras", like capital purchases, for the Library. The Book faire on October 20, 32 and 22 raised \$1,235.

6. Website Overhaul

We are currently overhauling the website in order to make it more logical, efficient, simplified, easier to maintain and of course include more accessible oriented practices. The revised website plan is written out on paper but will take some time to implement fully as Teresa is the only one who can and will be implementing the actual changes. It is a very time-consuming task but the wait will be worth it.

7. Meeting with local MLA Nicolas Simons

The three Library Directors from Gibsons (Heather), Sechelt (Leianne) and Powell River (Rebecca) met with Nicolas Simons, MLA, Powell River Sunshine Coast on October 3, 2023.

In our conversation, we focused on these areas:

- our programs and services that were tied to provincial priorities and responsibilities: health, social services, housing, emergency preparedness, reconciliation, local/provincial economies, education, accessibility, and government services

- the challenge we faced with provincial funding interfering with local funding and the confusion that surrounded the provincial marketing and wording (I will speak more about this in the Board meeting)

- challenges related to current funding levels: what are we not doing currently or what would we have to cut back if a permanent funding lift is not received. Such as: reduced hours, fewer Storytimes etc. and what that might mean to our communities.

This is the message all libraries sent to their local MLAs in preparation for our meetings:

To: Nicholas Simons, MLA Powell River- Sunshine Coast Re: October 3rd meeting with Library Directors from Powell River, Sechelt and Gibsons Public Libraries

Key Messages of BC Government Ask:

On behalf of every public library across our province, the BC Public Library Partners request the Government of BC allocate sustained funding to support BC public libraries through an increase in annual funding to \$30 million dollars per year. A core funding increase to \$30 million a year would maintain the current balance of 14% of funds going to shared, provincial services and 86% of the core funding going directly to public library systems.

BC's 71 public libraries, with 250 locations, serve as critical social infrastructure. These free and inclusive hubs provide safe and healthy public spaces, welcoming everyone in the community, acting as formal and informal pathways for learning in a safe, knowledgeable, and caring environment. Libraries contribute to local and provincial economies as employers, consumers, and by providing resources and support for entrepreneurs and job seekers. Basic literacy breaks down many barriers, enabling individuals to proceed to additional education and build their economic mobility.

The role of libraries continues to evolve and expand in response to social changes and community needs and demands. Much of that expansion is tied to provincial priorities and responsibilities: health, social services, housing, emergency preparedness, reconciliation, local/provincial economies, education, accessibility, and government services. As community hubs, we are increasingly an integral part of emergency plans for communities as they prepare for, and respond to, the impacts of a changing climate.

The BC Public Library Partners and our partners in communities throughout BC are grateful for the BC Government's one-time contributions. Without increasing the annual provincial grant for public libraries in BC to a sustainable level, libraries will find it difficult to continue to operate without cutting services such as reduced hours or fewer story times.

With adequate, stable, and sustained provincial funding, BC's public libraries will meet their communities' existing needs and continue to effectively respond to emerging needs tied to social changes and pressures.

Provincial funding is an essential support directly to local libraries and indirectly via sectoral infrastructure and organizations that help facilitate efficiency, leverage economies of scale to achieve savings at a provincial level and ensure libraries can support their communities throughout the province.

8. Some Interesting Stats Q1-Q3

From January 1, 2023 to September 30, 2023:

- 1. Jason has done 319 one-on-one tech appointments with patrons in our library's Room of Requirement. This doesn't count the total of regular, non-scheduled questions that Jason and all the library staff answer or problems they solve for patrons every day.
- 2. 22 people wrote an exam with our free exam invigilation services
- 3. Staff have made over 940 individual transactions with the sale of SCRD's Sunshine Coast transit tickets. That is a lot of staff time for a total commission to date of less than \$1000 but is a great service for our community.
- 4. Almost 25 people have had a private genealogy appointment with Teresa learning how to search their family history
- 5. Over 250 people in our community have had repairs done for free by the incredible team of Repair Café volunteers that work from our library on the second Saturday of each month.
- 6. As an example week, our automated patron counter for last week shows a 30% increase in library traffic over the same period last year

7. In August 2023 we had 8,163 visitors in the library. This monthly number to date has averaged between 6,125 per month and 8,163 per month.

- 8. New library memberships to date since January 1st are 666... So, in the first ³/₄ of 2023, we have already hit 93% of last year's total library memberships.
- 9. We have averaged 290 people per day in the library since January 1st.
- 10. Almost 100k items have been checked out of our library since January 1st.
- 11. Almost 25 persons have been able to speak with Janette about accessibility options that may be well suited to their needs.

9. Program Guides – October

As you saw from our October Program Guide, we had a <u>multitude</u> of programs and events during the month – many of them new and some now overcapacity. 


