

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4. Building Remediation (exterior) with the District of Sechelt

Phase 1:

The District of Sechelt official tender for Phase 1 remediation on the South side of the building is out and will close June 5, 2024. We participated (mostly observed) in a walkabout and question period for contractors a few weeks ago. We do know that is will be disruption for the library during the construction process but we cannot avoid that. More details in the Board meeting.



Phase 2:

The next DOS Committee of the Whole (COW) meeting where further remediation and plans for the tower (Phase 2) combined with possible extension options will be discussed on Wednesday June 26, 2024. Our Needs Assessment will be completed by then as well and Tony Osborne from TOAD will be speaking.

5. Needs Assessment with TOAD

We continue to work with Tony and his team at Tony Osborne Architecture and Design (TOAD) on creating a Needs Assessment for the Library. The "final draft" version they provided took us two full days to review thoroughly and there were many many markups on the return copy. I can tell you that it will show that an increase in size is more than warranted.

6. Building Flood Restoration

Slowly but surely, we progress in flood remediation process. There is much coordination with Coast Wide and different subcontractors in terms of building access, heating, cooling, dust levels and remediation timing.



From April 22, 2024 to current, here are some photos of contractos at work:

HiTech Electrical. Chosen and appointed by the insurance company (much to the disappointment of Coast Wide and ourselves). This company did the high voltage preliminary work.

Additional Steps Still to Go:

Clean-up from mudding and taping

Painting

Baseboards

Carpet Cleaning and Treating

Electrical completion – both high voltage (electrical lines) and low voltage (data lines)

Ceiling lighting (pot lights and fluorescent lighting (one additional going in)

Shelving reinstallation everywhere

Packing up the Pop-up

Moving everything from Pop-Up to main library

Getting the library back in order (1.5 - 2 weeks)

We are still looking at the same estimate we announced on April 22 – which was for re-opening fully first part of July. AGW!

7. Insurance Claim - Contents

Our official insurance claim for the contents lost during the January 17th flood was submitted and claim is still ongoing. To date, we have had <u>many frustrating back and forth discussions</u> with the insurers (AON) over some of the larger ticket items (\$5500 books and \$13K self-check). We still await final approval.

8. Insurance Statement of Values for 2024 insurance

Jessica, Rose, Jason and I have spent much time creating a list of everything we have in the library and attached value to it. These values form the basis of how our insurance premiums are calculated. The three categories are:

Library Circulating Items Computers and Technology Library furniture, shelving, décor and office supplies

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This information will be supplied to AON each year as our Statement of Values (through the DOS as we are part of their collective contents insurance). The DOS is also working on exact evaluations for their own properties.

Note: our two other insurance policies are done independently of the DOS and are directly between the Library and the Insurer.

10. BC Government SOFI and STATS

As we receive BC government funding each year (only the \$82K per year is somewhat consistent), we are required to do quite an amount of reporting.

- 1. Grant Reports = completed and submitted
- 2. SOFI (Statements of Financial Information) = completed and submitted
- **3**. Statistics = completed and submitted
- 4. Company and Board information = completed and submitted
- 5. Typical week = completed and submitted

Some interesting 2023 statistics (not all are used in the BC Provincial Stats):

- 1353 Bus ticket sales (23.56% increase from 2022)
- 807 New memberships (25.63% increase from 2022)
- 326 Incoming books from Pender Harbour via our courier (26.85% increase from 2022)
- 37 Outgoing books to Pender Harbour via our courier (50% decrease from 2022)
- 15869 WIFI users at Sechelt Library (17.77% increase from 2022)
- 46557 Website visits (5.62% increase from 2022) (not including catalogue visits)

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- 110 number of "unique" programs (adult, children and teen)
- 473 number of programs (adult, children and teen) sessions
- 5979 number of participants in library programs
- 6467 Public computer users at Sechelt Library (21.56% increase from 2022) (TW = 7750)
- 39573 Interactions (19.24% increase from 2022) (TW = 56800)
- 85481 Visitors to Library (21.37% increase from 2022) (TW = 91050)
- Average visitors per day (22.08% increase from 2022) (TW = 311 per day)
- 4891 Interlibrary loan lending: Sechelt items lent to other libraries
- 5849 Interlibrary loan borrowing: items we brought in from other libraries for Sechelt Library patrons

11. Changes to the Law Coming for Drug Use in Public Spaces

This will warrant some discussion with our local police regarding what we are to do and what we are to expect when someone is using drugs on our Library/ DOS property.

Ottawa approves B.C.'s request to recriminalize use of illicit drugs in public spaces

B.C. Premier David Eby asked for an adjustment to the province's decriminalization program late last month

Minister of Addictions and Mental Health Ya'ara Saks said Tuesday the federal government has approved the B.C. government's request to recriminalize the use of illicit drugs in public spaces.

The province is just over a year into a pilot program that allows adults to carry up to 2.5 grams of drugs for personal use without facing criminal charges. The program was made possible through an exemption granted by Health Canada under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

B.C. Premier David Eby asked nearly two weeks ago for an adjustment to the exemption order to recriminalize the use of those drugs in public spaces, such as hospitals and restaurants.

Saks told reporters outside the House of Commons that she has approved the request and it will take effect "immediately."

"We've moved forward with B.C. on this with a clear lens on public health and public safety, because we know that we need to address the opioid crisis and the overdose deaths that we're seeing as a public health issue," she said.

"That being said, communities need to be safe."

While adults would still be allowed to carry small amounts of illicit drugs and use them in private, they could be arrested for using them in public.



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
15. Summer Student 2024

This is the message we currently have up on our website. The OIPC office has been notified, they have conducted their work, and we all (as in all libraries) will taking the messages on our websites down at the end of the month.



Here were the "talking points" we created for staff in case someone called:


- 1. The BC Library Cooperative was hacked, not the Sechelt Library.
- 2. The hackers did try to ransom the information, the Library Coop refused to pay.
- 3. The data stolen was a transmission log, not patron records.
- 4. These logs only record that a message was sent to a patron by a BC Library Coop member library.
- 5. The records DO NOT contain the content of these messages.
- 6. Scammers might use these records to send false messages to people, pretending to be the library.
- 7. The Sechelt Library will NEVER ask for payment online.
