### 4. Annual General Meeting

The Sechelt Library Annual General Meeting is currently scheduled to be held on Wednesday March 26, 2025 (followed by the regular Library Board Meeting)

### 5. Canada Post Strike

The Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) which began a national strike on Friday November 15, 2024 officially ended December 17, 2025. As with any strike, indirect impacts to everyone are felt including libraries. Movement of library items between BC libraries - and throughout Canada via the Canada Post Service were affected. Those items that could still move via courier between Sechelt and Gibsons Library as well as libraries within in the Interlink Library Federation (mostly lower mainland) were still shipped of course. All our cheques to vendors, where possible, were hand delivered by Jessica.

### 6. New Furniture – thankyou Friends of the Library

We just had two pieces of black library shelving furniture, purchased 3 months ago, delivered and installed in the teen section. \$5K total for both – and a **big thankyou to the Friends of the Library** for funding this purchase. They also funded another piece of custom furniture for us in 2024 which is still set aside near self-checks due to flood and ongoing construction.





#### 7. BC Libraries Branch new Home


From Mari Martin, Director BC Public Libraries Branch:

"As you know our new cabinet was announced on November 18<sup>th</sup>. This resulted in a change in the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. Responsibility for public libraries (and the community literacy portfolio) has been assigned to the **Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs** under Honourable Minister Ravi Kahlon (MLA for Delta North).

The Public Libraries Branch team continues under the Local Government Division and Assistant Deputy Minister Tara Faganello."

### 8. Ceiling Flood – November 30, 2024

Early morning on Saturday Nov 30, a patron noticed water pouring down the post in the teen section and water bubbling on the ceiling. Library staff removed all the books (and computer) from the area as the cause and fix was not yet know. Dylan and I discussed with Signia but Dylan was the one who climbed up the scaffolding and figured out what was wrong. A downspout has been removed from the wall and it had been left uncovered to the elements. Water found its way into the walls, through our ceiling (not DOS ceiling), down the posts and onto the floor. A temporary cover has been put on and Signia will repair all the damage at a later date.



### 9. Ceiling Flood – December 14, 2024

#### Saturday Dec 14, 2024 - another ceiling Flood in the Teen Area

Two weeks later, we had another ceiling flood in the teen area caused by construction issues. The first flood (Saturday November 30) was caused by a removed downspout and water entry into the ceiling from outside. The flood on Dec 14 was caused by a leak in the temporary plastic downspout where water again poured into the building via our ceiling - and it was much worse.

#### Saturday Dec 14 am:

Janette did a 9:00am check along the whole south interior side of the library. We have so much renovation going on with barely covered walls - that we check this entire side carefully every morning. Everything was fine. Ten minutes later, Gail hears water pouring in. I was called and also I called Dylan - we both arrived at about 9:30. Janette and the Saturday team acted quickly and removed all the books away from the leaking sections (3 major sections) and had 6 buckets on the floor collecting water pouring in. We were able to unscrew the new custom wooden shelving units from the wall and move them out - just in time - to prevent water damage. We also had to put plastic under other furniture, just replaced from the 6-month flood, in order to prevent additional water soaking up.

If it were not for the quick actions of Dylan (DOS), who climbed the scaffolding and figured out the problem



- as well as the library staff moving so quickly to remove everything - we would have had catastrophic damage (once again).

Everything is under control now but the teen section was in disarray and had to be closed off to the public for quite a few days. Damage in the ceiling, through the light switches, sprinkler head and wifi boosters were assessed for permanent moisture damage.

If this flood had occurred on Saturday night or Sunday – or any other time we weren't working - can you imagine...



### 10. Electrical and Lighting

During the flood restoration, we determined that it was the perfect time to "fix" some massive electrical shortcomings that our library, built 26 years ago, could not address in its current state. We are very restricted with layout and function by the lack of electrical and data outlets. We had 5 new electrical outlets installed by the electricians in the front half of the library. \$200 x 5 (at our cost).

During the flood restoration, some but not all of the lighting fixtures were replaced in the front half. It left us with a very visible across the library strip of unsightly looking lighting. Different types of lighting and different lighting hues. We choose to have 6 additional "new" lights installed (\$6 x 200) (again at our cost).

### 11. Building Remediation – Exterior of DOS / Library Building

South side (Phase 1) restoration and construction includes:

#### South side restoration will include:

- 1. Wall rot assessed and repaired (inside and out)
- 2. New windows installed
- 3. Siding removed and replaced with new fiber-cement siding (ie. hardie-board)
- 4. New aluminum awnings on both levels
- 5. New building trim
- 6. Refresh of all exterior beams and posts
- 7. Landscape improvements and beautification of lawn, benches and sitting areas
- 8. Trim or remove all wisteria
- 9. Removal of large tree and removal and relocation of rose bushes away from the building

#### **Activities since last Library Director's Report:**

#### Exterior Wall Assessment:

Ongoing for quite some time and very loud. More exterior damage on exterior of our "biography" section was still being found as late as week of January 6 (after new windows were already in)



### Beam replacement:

November 28 front door post replacement. 6 posts in total were replaced.







It was also determined that a beam needed replacement. Unfortunately, this exterior beam also came into the interior of the library - in the magazine and public computer section. Major disruption for public and staff entry into this section. Photo taken on Jan 13




Director's Report

### Interior Wall Repair:

Repairing the interior of the south side has greatly affected the library - programs, collection accessibility, and space available to the public. Although Signia initially anticipated to do one section at a time, the reality has not been that. It has been lengthy and ongoing and disruptive for both staff and patrons in all sections at all times. **ONGOING** 







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### Window Replacement:

All south side windows have now been removed, replaced with the old, removed again and then replaced with new. Commenced at end of November and there is one more still to complete. As access to the children's area (and many other areas) has been blocked due to construction for at least two months, we planned that, after Christmas, we would set up an area for children and incorporate some public seating in this new zone as well. It is now "built" and families have been enjoying every day. It is also still highly used for newspaper reading and other purposes.



## Time-traveling sisters tap appetite for literacy

An all-ages spectacle featuring tap, swing and threepart harmony has been assembled by the Sunshine Coast Literacy Coalition to mark BC's Family Literacy Week.

Family Literacy Week, including Family Literacy Day, which takes place on Jan. 27 each year, highlights how families can learn together through daily activities and is celebrated through organized events at schools, libraries and communities across Canada.

The Sunshine Coast Literacy Coalition will produce two performances by The Myrtle Sisters on Friday, Jan. 24. The "sisters" are a trio of East Vancouver performers — Candice Roberts, Nayana Flelkov, and Kat Single-Dain — who have been performing as an ensemble for nearly 15 years. All three are practiced in the serious discipline of clowning.

"People think: you're clowns, that's the red nose, said Roberts. 'But clowning means we're trained in the art of play and interaction and presence and being able to see the audience and have them see us. It's about creating a shared space of joy with a group of people, making up an experience together."

The Myrtle Sisters pre-

The Myrtle Sisters presentation will focus on self-expression and celebrating differences, using original and historic live music and dance. The group has performed the show and its companion pieces at schools throughout the province, including their latest tour: a weeklong engagement in Port McNeill that culminated in a vaudeville-style performance for the entire community.

The three songstresses based their collective persona on Jazz Age song-andtrios, but regularly update their repertoire with ting-edge footwork. In the midst of recent mances set in 1921, they presented vintage dance and the Big Apple - then invited young audience members to demonstrate their moves. The Myrtles learned to Floss, did the Orange Justice dance (popularized by the video game Fortnite), and mastered the Griddy Dance made famous on TikTok.

Single-Dain is a professional swing dance instructor, Roberts herself is a tapdancer and ukulele player.

"People will be like, 'Oh,

As a group, the Myrtles incorporate literacy into their craft. "We're all read-ers," said Roberts, "We're telling a story, and we're also telling the story of ourselves." She recently pursued studies in creative nonfiction and embarked on a project of writing memoirs.

Literacy Coalition's purpose is to support projects that enhance lifelong literacy. The coalition is comprised of Capilano University, the Gibsons and District Public Library, Pender Harbour Community School, School District 46, Sechelt Public

Library, the Sunshine Coast Festival of the Written Arts, Sunshine Coast Welcoming Communities; local author and editor Kallie George and Langdale Elementary Teacher-Librarian Karen Webb. The pair of concerts on Jan. 24 is financially supported by the Raisea-Reader campaign and the Sunshine Coast Credit Union.

"It's a sharp team," said coalition leader Trudi Diening, the literacy outreach coordinator at the kālax-ay (or Sunshine Coast campus) of Capilano University. "We've been doing it for so long and many people have no idea who we are, but still we're loud and proud about it."

In September, the coalition distributed 247 copies of The Wildflower to Kindergarten students in School District 46. The handout was followed by a picnic at the Sunshine Coast Botanical Garden. The Wildflower illustrator Sara Gillingham attended the event, signed every book, and sketched a picture on each frontispiece. Literacythemed booths and give aways have become a leature of local Pride Month

celebrations and public health centres.

In April, the group will hold its inaugural teen writing contest, which is being spearheaded by the Gibsons Public Library. Sponsorship for it and other coalition activities flows from Decoda Literacy Solutions, a provincial network of literacy stakeholders.

Diening said that literacy coordinators in other parts of BC have commented on the high proportion of performance-related campaigns on the Sunshine Coast. "I say simply: this is the community we live in and it's alive, so we want to support it," she explained.

The Myrtle Sisters shows for children (and families) take place at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 24 at xwesam-Roberts Creek Community Hall. Admission is free for both events, but preregistration is required at www.sd46. bc.ca/register-now-family-literacy-day-celebrations/.



# THE BOUNTY OF BOOK FAIRE

### Library volunteers' lucrative non-profit is a book-lover favourite

HEN SOMEONE REMINDS YOU THERE'S A BOOK FAIRE coming up at the Sechelt Public Library, they could be suggesting one of two things: Either you should start getting rid of the ridiculous number of books you have piled up everywhere, or you might want to

Book Faire has indeed become a popular institution on the Sunshine Coast. After more than 12 years of nearly monthly, Friday-to-Sunday sales at the library's combined lobby/committee room, the Faire has a reputation for accepting donations only of lightly used books. They'll then be turned around and sold for up to \$2.50 (\$1 for pocketbooks), or five hardcovers for \$10. To Coasters, that's irresistible.

"The Sunshine Coast is addicted to books," said Sandra Friedman, co-chair of Friends of the Sechelt Public Library (FSPL), which runs Book Faire. "People here feel that if you don't have a pile of books under your bed or beside it, then you feel very insecure. So, we sell books."

Do they ever. Many customers walk out with a literal

armload. Sales revenue over three days can often total \$1,000 to \$2,000. And, despite the challenges of the pandemic years and a grievous flood at its venue last winter, Book Faire has generated a whopping \$230,000 since 2012. All funds, except for storage-locker and insurance expenses, go to the library, and that has made an enormous difference.

"The Friends of Library were integral to our survival when we weren't funded adequately," Sechelt Public Library Director Leianne Emery said in an interview. "Now they're integral to keeping it beautiful, and warm, and inviting and professional. I don't take lightly what they do for us."

Emery noted the library has three primary funders, the District of Sechelt, the Sunshine Coast Regional District, and the shishall First Nation.

"But that funding is for operations only," Emery said. "If we need a new shelf, new chairs, new computers, those are capital assets, and I don't have any budget for any of that. If I can't find the money from a grant—and we apply for lots—I can't buy them. This library would not look anywhere nearly this beautiful if the Friends had not contributed what they have over the years."

Book Faire income has paid for everything from DVDs and board games for a few hundred dollars to more than \$18,000 for three rolling magazine-storage shelves, and more than \$26,000 for two, state-of-the-art book-checkout machines. Thousands more have been spent on durable and comfortable easy chairs. Subtle but costly improvements like bookcase bottom shelves that are sloped upwards also ease and enhance the library user-experience.

"Things are expensive," said Emery. "Without [Book Faire] funding, we just don't have the same kind of library."

Friends of the Sechelt Public Library was founded in 1997 to develop ways to help fill those budget gaps. The society ran some small-scale projects like raffles and one-day book sales, but by 2012, Friedman and Gillian Smith, now FSPL co-chairs, knew they had to up their fundraising game. >>

"We don't do December, and sometimes not January."

In 2024, for the first time since it began, there also was no Book Faire in February due to a calamitous mid-January water leak that rained down from the District of Sechelt Municipal Office on the floors above. "The whole front half of the library was destroyed," Emery said.

Damage was so extensive that the library had to close completely for nearly six months, until early July. Funds from Book Faires would be needed more than ever, but the sales could not be based in the library lobby. So, except for one weekend at the Sechelt Activity Centre, Book Faire moved a block away to the Seaside Centre on Teredo St. for half of 2024. It didn't return to its library home this year until September.

#### 'LUGGERS.' 'SETTER-UPPERS' AND 'SMOOSHERS'

Wherever its venue, Book Faire runs smoothly thanks to a volunteer corps who manage all the merchandise, which is stored in hundreds of cardboard boxes containing thousands upon thousands of books. About a dozen helpers contribute hours as "luggers," "setter-uppers," "smooshers," or "floorwalkers." That is, they take on the tasks of lugging the boxes to the library from the Faire's Sechelt storage lockers, setting up the boxes by category on dozens of tables, and then "smooshing" them (squeezing them efficiently) into their boxes—and ensuring each book ends up in the right box.

"We can make mistakes," said Friedman. "Somebody will put *Chicken Soup for the Soul* in with the cookbooks. It happens."

The floorwalkers answer questions, help keep things tidy and do more smooshing to accommodate yet more books dropped off at the donations table. The volunteers at that station are the gatekeepers charged with maintaining Book Faire's reputation for quality. You don't get to donate just any book. Certainly, no book that is "worn, torn, underlined, highlighted, dusty, dirty, moldy or in otherwise poor condition," according to FSPL's page on the library website. No computer books or manuals, no Readers' Digest condensed books, no textbooks, no encyclopedias. The donations table volunteers are cheerful but firm.

"It's taken a long time to train our people to say, 'No, we're not taking this,' Friedman said.

Adds Smith: "I couldn't do the donation table, because I'd be too willing to take everything. People are being good enough to give to their books away and we can't insult them. But at the same time, those who come to buy know the books on our tables are going to be in dam good shape."

The library website will list dates for 2025 Book Faires. They're open from 12 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Fridays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays, and Sundays 12 p.m. to 3 p.m. (Donations are not accepted on Sundays.)

"There have been some very frugal years here," Emery said. "And the 'Friends' have been a saviour." **CL**

Dylan has consistently gone above and beyond to address day-to-day building issues, responding promptly and ensuring that both the needs of our staff and the integrity of the shared Library/DOS building remain a priority. His clear communication and commitment to finding effective solutions have made him an invaluable partner to our team.

Most recently, Dylan demonstrated exceptional professionalism during two unexpected ceiling floods at the library.
